

## 2025 Cornell Survey of Sexual Assault and Related Misconduct: Tables of Survey Results

In spring 2025, Cornell conducted the Survey of Sexual Assault and Related Misconduct. This survey asked about students' experiences with inappropriate sexual behavior while attending Cornell, including nonconsensual sexual contact, sexual and gender-based harassment, stalking, and domestic and dating violence. The survey also asked about students' knowledge of Cornell resources and policies concerning sexual assault and related misconduct; and their experiences with and beliefs about responding as a bystander to situations involving sexual assault or misconduct.

A stratified, random sample of 6,000 students enrolled at the Ithaca, Weill Cornell Medicine, and Cornell Tech campuses was invited to participate in this web-based survey. A total of 926 students completed the survey, yielding a 15% response rate.

The results of the 2025 Survey of Sexual Assault and Related Misconduct are displayed in the tables that follow. Survey responses are broken out for all students; for women and men, by enrollment status (undergraduate or graduate/professional); and for students who reported a non-binary gender identity [identified in the tables as TGQN]. The letter "s" indicates a result has been suppressed due to a cell count of less than 5.

Notes: The survey population included all students who were enrolled in both the Fall 2024 and Spring 2025 semesters. Non-degree seeking and Employee Degree students were excluded, as were students who were in absentia, or studying off-campus beyond New York City.

From this population, a random sample of 6,000 Cornell students, stratified by campus, was invited to participate in the survey.

Survey response rates are calculated by dividing the number of respondents by the number of students in the survey sample.

TGQN includes the following gender identities: transgender woman/trans feminine, transgender man/trans masculine, genderqueer, non-binary, agender, two spirit, and questioning or unsure.
