Sianne Ngai is Professor of English at the University of Chicago. She is the author of Ugly Feelings (2007) and Our Aesthetic Categories: Zany, Cute, Interesting (2015), awarded the MLA's James Russell Lowell Prize for best book. Her new book in progress, "Theory of the Gimmick," explores the uneasy mix of attraction and repulsion produced by the gimmick across a range of forms specific to western capitalism, including the novel of ideas.

Timothy Bewes is Professor of English at Brown. He is the author of Cynicism and Postmodernity (1997); Reification, or The Anxiety of Late Capitalism (2002); and The Event of Postcolonial Shame (2011). He has edited Jacques Rancière and the Novel (2014), The Contemporary Novel: Imagining the Twenty-First Century (2012), Georg Lukacs: The Fundamental Dissonance of Existence (2011, with Timothy Hall), Cultural Capitalism (2001, with Jeremy Gilbert), and a special issue titled After Fanon (2002). He has served as an editor of NOVEL since 2005.
