PS 350 Politics & Film (On-Line) Summer 2025 Priscilla L. Southwell

Political content tends to saturate many films, in both explicit and implicit ways. A primary goal of this class will be to examine the political relevance of films, as they relate to actual political events and developments. The required films are grouped by broad thematic categories, from the United States and various other countries. Starting from these examples, this course aims to characterize film as an especially apt medium for illustrating, defending, challenging, and engaging political ideas.

Quizzes and the final exam (if you choose this option) for this course will be based on this latest (2nd) edition of *Projecting Politics*, the PowerPoints, and the required 16 films.

Note: You must obtain these films on your own and watch them at your own pace, but I would recommend that you see at least two films a week, or you will quickly fall behind. You should also watch the PowerPoint that is associated with each of the <u>four</u> films associated with each section and quiz. These PowerPoints are available on the "Files" tab on Canvas.

Keep in mind that you may have to rent or buy the following movies, in some cases, but many of these films are available in the UO Knight Library, in your local library, on YouTube, Netflix or Amazon Prime.

QUIZZES: There are four quizzes in this class – each covering the four required films, the PowerPoints, and 3-4 chapters in the textbook, for each section, as listed on the

syllabus. All quizzes will be taken on-line via CANVAS, and you are not permitted to consult the textbook, the Internet or notes while taking these quizzes. The quizzes are all contained within the folder called "Quizzes." You will have 30 minutes to take each quiz, and you may re-take each quiz once, and the highest grade will be recorded. There are 20 multiple choice questions per quiz, but your second attempt may have different questions, as they are randomly picked from a larger test bank. Each quiz is worth 12.5% of your grade.

FINAL EXAM OR FINAL PAPER:

You must choose one of the following two options:

Option 1: Final Exam

I will email the final exam to you **on Sunday, September 14, 4 p.m. (PDT)** and your answers must be submitted through the "Assignments" on the CANVAS website in the "Assignments" folder, by **Sunday, September 14, 6 p.m. (PDT)** It will consist primarily of short essay questions. This exam will be run through "Turnitin" to protect against plagiarism.

Let me know immediately if you do not receive it. If you decide to wait until later in the day to let me know that you have not received the final, you will not be granted an extension past the 6 p.m. deadline. For every hour that this exam is late, your grade will be reduced by 10 points. There will be no early exams or make-up exams, so please do not schedule any travel, work, or other commitments during this time period. If you plan to take this exam, but miss it for any reason, you will be required to write the paper instead.

Option 2: Final Paper

Instead, you may opt out of the final exam and write a 8-10 page paper instead This paper must be submitted on the CANVAS website in the "Assignments" folder for this class by **Sunday, September 14, 6 p.m. (PDT)**, although you can turn it in earlier. This paper will be run through "Turnitin" to protect against plagiarism. The topic of this paper may be of your own choosing, but must pertain directly to one or more of the required films and analysis from *Projecting Politics*. A critique of the analysis offered in this book is certainly acceptable, but not required. A paper guidelines sheet is available on CANVAS in the "Files" folder. For every hour that it is late, your grade will be reduced by 10 points.
