Land Acknowledgement

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Acknowledgement of Northeastern University's Student Handbook

The [Code of Student Conduct](#) applies both on and off campus, to all Northeastern University students, at all levels of study, in all colleges and programs locally or abroad, on-ground or online, as well as all student groups and organizations. The University establishes guidelines for the behaviours of its students to promote student conduct that does not adversely affect the educational mission of the University, members of the University community, its relationship with the surrounding community, sister institutions, or co-op partners.

Students are expected to display proper respect for the rights and privileges of other members of the University community and their guests. The atmosphere in classes, laboratories, online, and at university events must be free from undue disruption. Furthermore, students must follow the reasonable directions of university personnel. Students are expected to be honest and forthright in their course of dealings with the University. Falsification, distortion, or misrepresentation of information to the University or University officials could result in being charged with a violation of the Northeastern University Code of Student Conduct.

By accepting a Husky ID at Northeastern University in Toronto campus, you agree to abide by all policies outlined in the Northeastern Student Handbook, as well as the following:

- *Only authorized persons may be given access to keys/cards that permit entry to buildings and locked spaces on the University campus. All members of the University community are responsible for cards assigned to them.*
- *Lost or stolen cards must be reported immediately to a staff member. There is a \$25 replacement fee for a Husky ID.*
- *You may not share your Husky ID or code with anyone, nor may you use the Husky ID of another student.*
- *You may only enter the campus through the main doors.*
- *You will not permit other students to enter from any entrance other than those designated as a point of entry.*
- *You are responsible for the behaviour of your guest. All guests must be signed in at the front desk and receive a visitor badge. You are expected to escort your guest at all times.*
- *You must display your Husky ID card on your person at all times when on campus as confirmation of identification.*
- *You are responsible for the spaces you use and should return them to the state in which you found them. Use of Northeastern facilities should be related to the academic mission of the University.*

Northeastern University Toronto Professional Community Standards

As a graduate student at Northeastern University Toronto, you are building a professional reputation in one of Canada's most active industry ecosystems. These guidelines apply across all aspects of your experience, including classes, events, co-op placements, capstone projects, hackathons, networking sessions, and all other university-organized or affiliated activities, and are in addition to the institutional Code of Student Conduct.

1. Honour Your Commitments

Your word is your professional currency. If you register for something, show up. If you cannot attend, cancel or notify the organizer at least 24 hours in advance. Repeated no-shows may limit your access to future opportunities.

2. Show Up Ready to Engage

Being present means more than just showing up physically. Arrive on time, minimize distractions, and participate meaningfully.

3. Represent Northeastern with Professionalism

Every interaction is an opportunity to make a lasting impression. The faculty, staff, and industry professionals you interact with are potential employers, supervisors, and references. Present yourself with care, engage genuinely, and follow up where appropriate.

4. Treat Everyone with Respect

The community you build here will follow you throughout your career. Engage collaboratively with peers, faculty, staff, and industry guests. Offer and receive feedback constructively and resolve conflicts directly and respectfully. Your cohort is your professional network.

5. Communicate Proactively

A brief message early is always better than silence. If something comes up, say something as soon as possible. Contact the event organizer, your advisor, or the Career and Experiential Learning team rather than no-showing or staying quiet.

A Note on Expectations: Supporting Student Success

When these expectations are not met, concerns are addressed progressively and supportively, typically starting with a follow-up message or conversation from a Toronto staff or faculty member. Repeated or serious issues may be reported to the Office of Student Conduct and Conflict Resolution (OSCCR) and may affect access to programming, co-op, or experiential learning opportunities. The goal is to help you build habits that will serve you throughout your career.

Location

The Toronto campus is located at 375 Queen Street West. Everyone must use the main entrance at the corner of Queen Street West and Peter Street and may use the elevator or internal staircase to reach their desired floor. All students must check in with their Husky Cards. All guests must be checked in by a Northeastern staff member and must remain with the host at all times.

Access by Public Transportation

The Queen Street West campus is accessible via the 501B streetcar which travels along Queen Street between Spadina and Bay. The closest subway station to the campus is Osgoode Station on Line 1. Visit ttc.ca for a detailed map of the transit routes.

Where to Buy Tickets and Passes

We recommend that students obtain a PRESTO card. This is an electronic reloadable payment card that lets you pay your fare on the TTC, Go Transit, UP Express, and 8 other transit services in Ontario. Simply tap your card once upon boarding the train or bus. When getting your card, there will be a one-time \$6.00 fee. You can buy a PRESTO card at a fare vending machine, Shoppers Drug Mart locations, official Customer Service Outlets, or online at prestocard.ca. Never buy a card or try to load funds and passes through an unauthorized seller.



Presto on the TTC

Cash fare on the TTC is \$3.35. With a PRESTO card, the fare is \$3.30. Commuters get two hours travel in any direction on the TTC with each payment. When you start your trip and tap your PRESTO card, your fare will be deducted, and a two-hour transfer will automatically be applied to your card. Each time you hop on and off the system or switch directions, just tap your PRESTO card again.

Presto on the GO Transit

You can use your [PRESTO](#) card when taking a GO train, GO bus, or a combination of both for your trip. For more information or to calculate the fare of your trip, you may visit gotransit.com.

Access by Car

There is no onsite parking at the campus. You can visit parking.greenp.com for the nearest paid parking options.

Hours of Operation

Our regular hours of operation are Monday-Thursday 8:30AM-9:00PM and Friday 8:30AM-6:00PM. Hours may be extended in the case of evening courses or special events. Refer to the Academic Calendar for holiday closures. Any changes to hours of operation will be communicated via Student Services or the Operations Team.

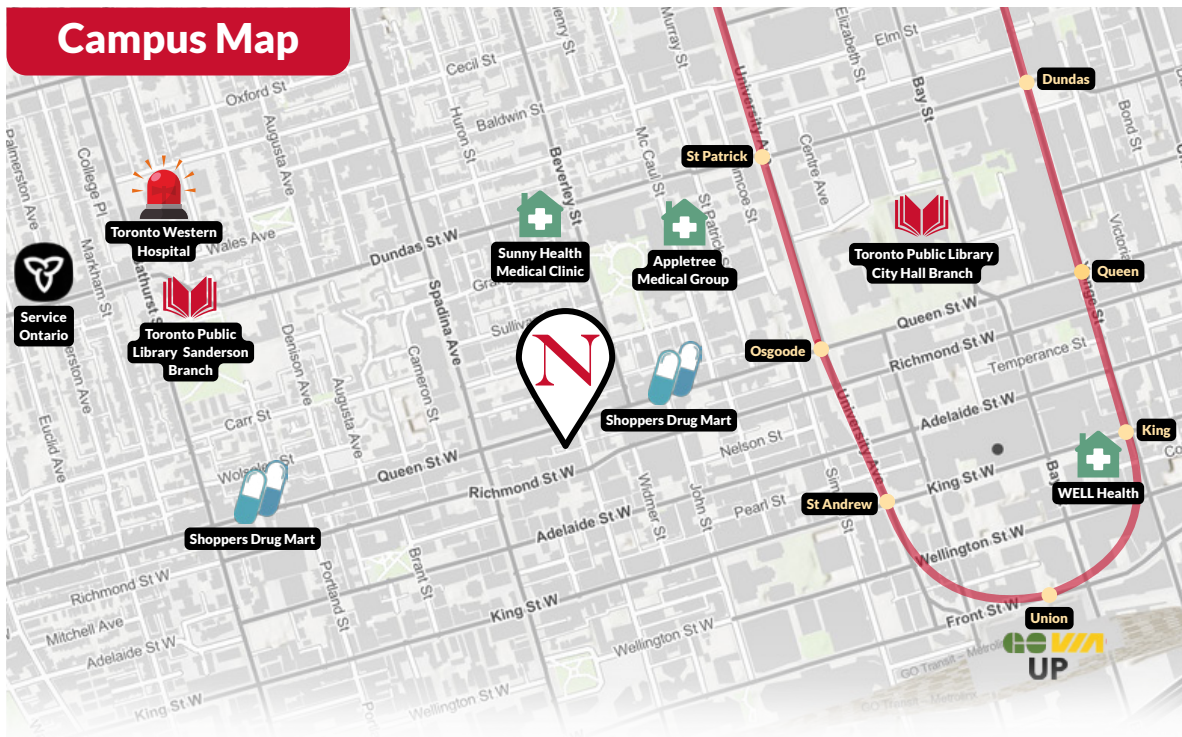
Other Important Policies

Campus Resources

Facilities

The Toronto Campus features 14 learning spaces, dedicated event space, bookable study rooms, phone rooms, open and quiet study spaces, wellness rooms, multifaith rooms, fridges, microwaves, and printers for student use. There are also bike lockers and day use lockers available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Student Support Services

The Student Services team (TOSTudentServices@northeastern.edu) is available to direct students to appropriate resources across the Northeastern Global University System, and to address any issues that arise with respect to Toronto student experience.

All students have access to academic advising. Advisors meet with students in one-to-one and group sessions and advise on topics like course selection, course registration, and other academic policies and processes. Students can find contact details and appointment schedules for advisors on the [Student Life website](#).

The Office of Global Services (international.northeastern.edu/ogs) is available to provide information and guidance to international students on all matters related to immigration status and studying in Canada. Wireless Internet

Secure NUwave wireless internet is available to all Northeastern students and faculty. Users can login using their Student Hub credentials. Guests at the Toronto campus have access to NUwave-Guest. Users, please note that this network does not offer data encryption. For questions related to wireless access email help@northeastern.edu. For more information, refer to the Information Technology Services (ITS) webpage at its.northeastern.edu.

Husky Cards

The Husky Card is your student ID. It is required to gain access to the campus and students are required to always have their Husky Card with them as valid ID while on campus.



How to get a Husky Card:

Students are recommended to upload their own photo before the scheduled campus Orientation via the [Applicant Portal](#).

Click the link under Husky Card Preferences to submit or look for an email from huskycard@northeastern.edu with instructions. Husky Cards will be available for pick-up at the scheduled Orientation Welcome Day(s) or your first day of on-ground class.

The first Husky Card is issued free of charge. Replacement cards are \$25.

Printing & Scanning

Printing is available on campus and requires a Husky Card for access. Students are annually provided a limited amount of free printing. The annual credit does not rollover from year to year.

Printing Costs

At the start of the academic year, students receive a \$120 printing credit on their Husky Cards.

Printer Type	Paper Size	Cost
Black and white	8.5x11	\$0.10
Colour	8.5x11	\$0.30

The cost of printing is automatically deducted from the student's printing credits.

Students can check their remaining print allowance by logging into The Student Hub.

For scanning and printing needs, students can use the Konica Minolta on the 3rd or 5th floor. Should you require printing or scanning assistance while on campus, reach out to the Toronto IT team.



Co-op & Career Services

The Career Development and Experiential Learning team is a resource for students seeking success in the Canadian job market. All students have access to Career Services and Co-op advisors who support students in their career development journey right from orientation through a variety of workshops, events, and 1:1 advising. Campus Safety

The designated Emergency Fire Wardens for the campus are the Operations team, they will facilitate evacuation procedures.



Upon Discovery of Fire or Smoke

1. Leave the affected area immediately.
2. Close all doors behind you.
3. Activate the Fire Alarm Pull Station.
4. Use the EXIT stairwell(s) and/or an exterior EXIT to evacuate the building.
5. Call the Fire Department at 911 (from a safe location, only when safe to do so).

DO NOT ATTEMPT TO USE THE ELEVATOR.

Medical Emergency

In the event of a medical emergency on campus, please follow these steps:

1. Call 911 and provide:

- a. Campus address (375 Queen Street West)*
- b. Floor number and any room details*
- c. Type of emergency (i.e. bleeding, shortness of breath, etc.)*
- d. Any information requested (do not hang up until directed to do so)*

2. Alert a staff member immediately.

Elevator Entrapment

If you are trapped in an elevator, please follow these guidelines:

1. Remain calm

2. Press the call button on the elevator's control panel

3. Do not try to free yourself or escape. Await instructions and assistance.

Suspicious Object

If you notice an object that looks out of place or suspicious, DO NOT TOUCH IT. Alert a member of staff immediately.

Severe Weather

In the event of severe weather, students will be informed of any campus closures via email, and the NU Alert system.

What is Mental Health?

It influences how we think and feel about ourselves and others and how we interpret events. It affects our capacity to learn, communicate, and form, sustain or end relationships, and it influences our ability to cope with change, transition, and life events.

What is a Mental Health Crisis?

A situation in which a person's thoughts, emotions, and behaviours can put them in jeopardy of harming themselves or others and/or put them at risk of being unable to care for themselves or access food, clothing, and shelter.

Toronto offers a variety of fitness and recreation options perfect for students looking to stay active and meet new people. The city's core provides easy access to numerous gyms, outdoor activities, and organized sports leagues that cater to all fitness levels and interests.

For traditional gym workouts, students can choose from the options for gyms and fitness clubs listed below. Many also provide group fitness classes, personal training, and specialized equipment.

Outdoor enthusiasts will find running and biking opportunities and several local running clubs that welcome newcomers and organize regular group runs.
