- Enhanced Organization Visibility: Through the development of our website and social media platforms, we've significantly increased our organization's visibility, connecting with new and current students, faculties and the broader audience.

AGSA'S FOUNDATIONAL MILESTONES A Timeline of Formation, Community building, and Firsts

First Meeting

February 13, 2023

This meeting was held to discuss AGSA's establishment roadmap. Attended by Femi Lamptey, NASO president, Beza Ayalaw, co-founder & outgoing VP of AGSA, Etta Brooks, then-Project Manager of AGI, co-founder & outgoing president of AGSA, & Promise Onyibe, Global Partnerships Assistant at Employer Engagement.



March 20, 2023

Engagement With Advisor

Etta and Beza met with Dr. Richard Wamai to discuss plans to establish AGSA and advising. It was an exciting coincidence as Dr. Wamai had been in conversations with other professors to establish a community body for African graduate students.



August 15, 2023

Notification of preliminary recognition

While we did not yet possess the full privileges of a mature organization, this phase served as an opportunity for growth. Upon demonstrating progress, we were called to advance to the next stage or the tentative recognition stage.



October 3, 2023

First Executive Board Meeting

The first E-Board Meeting was held in the College of Social Sciences and Humanities at Northeastern University Renaissance Park. Initially, we had six e-board members, and later, four more were added.



October 10, 2023

First Full Student Body Meeting

Meet & Greet event, the first gathering with the entire student body was meant to discuss the ongoing establishment of AGSA, opportunities to serve in leadership roles, and foster connections. On October 13, 2023, AGSA received Tentative recognition.



February 1, 2024

Student Government presentation

Bezawit Ayalew, Etta Brooks, Stephen Adepoju, Abdullahi Bello, and Victor Kaweesa presented AGSA to the Graduate Student Government. This was the final step to receiving full recognition. AGSA was voted approved on this day and later received an official recognition email.



February 15, 2024

Full Recognition


AGSA received full recognition and is now eligible to receive all privileges of a recognized student organization.
















AFRICAN GRADUATE STUDENTS IN NUMBERS






Graduate Enrollment - By Country 2024




Graduate Enrollment - By Campus 2024



Jeffrey Machyo, Kenya MS'23, cyber physical systems

An excerpt from the College of Engineering piece written about Jeffrey:

Jeffrey Machyo, MS'23, cyber physical systems, decided to shift gears to the embedded systems field when he was working as an electrical engineer at an electric power company in Kenya. At Northeastern, he completed a co-op at Desktop Metal, which gave him hands-on experience with programable devices and set him up for a successful career change.



As an electrical engineer at the Geothermal Development Co. in Kenya, Jeffrey Machyo, MS'23, cyber physical systems, found sensors and programmable controllers fascinating, and a bit frustrating. If a problem cropped up with one of these devices, he would need to seek technical support from the manufacturer, a process that could take days.

So, after a seven-year career in power systems, Machyo, who had received a BS in electrical engineering in 2013 from the University of Nairobi, started a search for an advanced degree program focused on embedded systems. As he was scanning YouTube videos for information, he learned about Northeastern's graduate engineering programs, including co-op opportunities.

"The Northeastern co-op plan would give me an extended amount of time to get some practical training," Machyo says. "So that's why Northeastern became a no-brainer."

In 2021, he began an MS in the cyber physical system program. One of the highlights was his six-month co-op at the Burlington, Massachusetts-based Desktop Metal, which he began in July 2022.

"What hit me is that we can't control nature, and we can't control when it rains, but we can definitely control how we use the resource," Machyo says. "I haven't thought it through fully yet, but the ultimate thing would be to find a way through work to give back to my Kenyan people."
