## What Do I Wish I Had Known?


- I wish I had known the laws of Germany before going that pertained to the work I was doing

## What Did I Learn About Myself?

- Ended up being pretty successful and explaining to incoming interns how to do the database work

## **Preparation and Interviewing Process**

This is done through monthly newsletters, meetings, protests, events, etc. At the Annual General Meeting in Berlin, I met American's who were living in England, the Czech Republic, Norway, and Spain. This kind of connectedness would not be possible without the modern day "shrinking" of the world due to technology.
