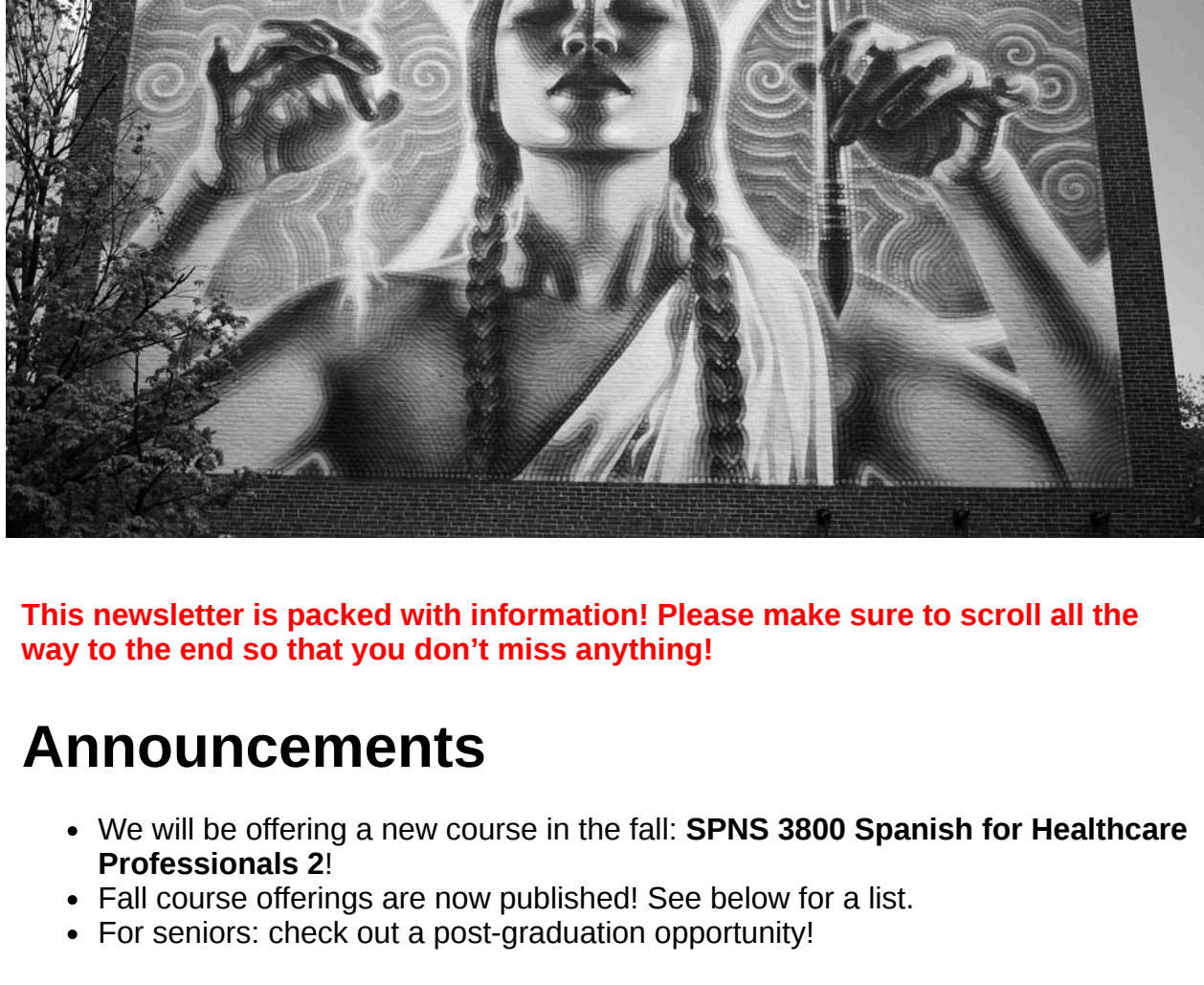

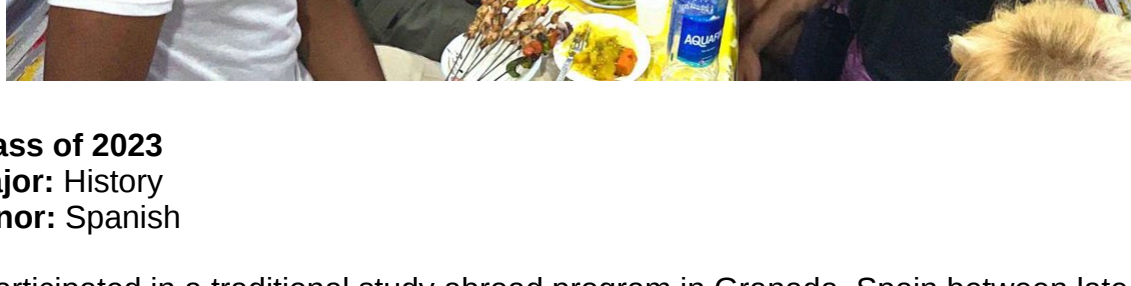

I attended the Centro de Lenguas Modernas, a school within the University of Granada. Pictured above is myself and a few of the dear friends I made during my time in Spain. All of our classes were taught in Spanish, but some of the best Spanish-speaking experiences took place outside the classroom. A memory that stands out is a road trip we did where our knowledge of Spanish helped us to rent a car, navigate small towns where nobody spoke English, make new friends, get directions and advice, and generally assimilate more into the culture of the country we were living in. People were really open and went out of their way to help us because we were able to engage them in their native language. 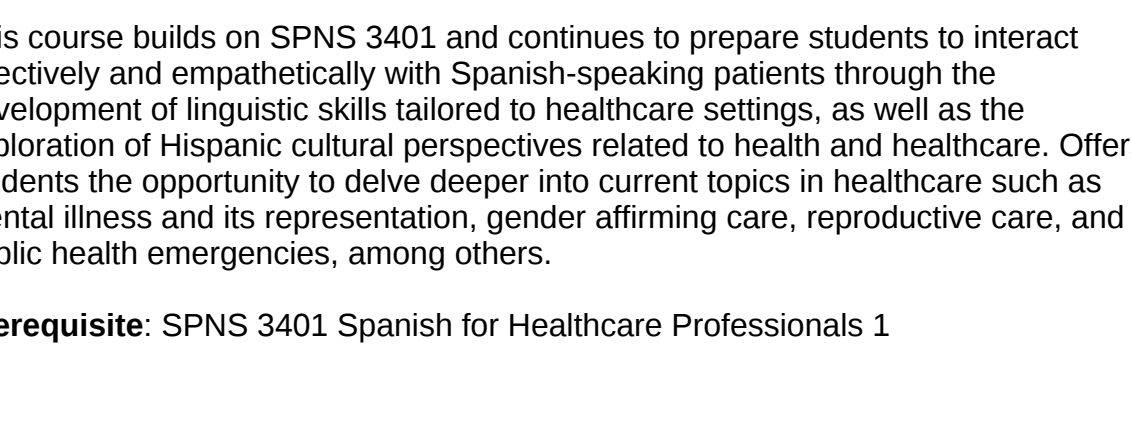

We are excited to announce a brand new course: SPNS 3800 Spanish for Healthcare Professionals 2! In the future, this course will be offered as SPNS 3402.



This course builds on SPNS 3401 and continues to prepare students to interact effectively and empathetically with Spanish-speaking patients through the development of linguistic skills tailored to healthcare settings, as well as the exploration of Hispanic cultural perspectives related to health and healthcare. Offers students the opportunity to delve deeper into current topics in healthcare such as mental illness and its representation, gender affirming care, reproductive care, and public health emergencies, among others.

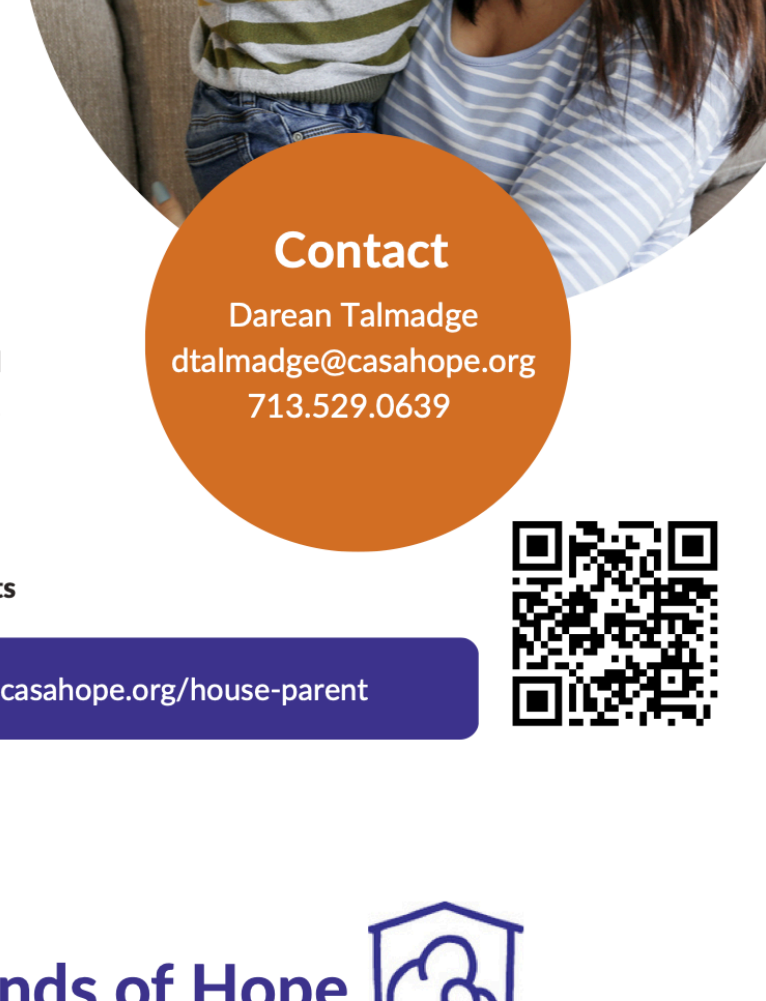

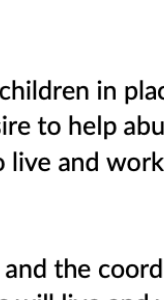

About the Hands of Hope Service Year Program

About the Program

Hands of Hope House Parents provide direct childcare and supervision to children in placement in the Casa de Esperanza Neighborhood. These passionate individuals have the ability to live and work abused, neglected and HIV positive children by making a 12-month commitment to reside with help with vulnerable children in the agency's private foster homes.

What will I be doing?

Responsibilities include daily care of the children, household management, and the coordination of medical appointments and therapy sessions. Hands of Hope House Parents will live and work with other recent graduates, caring for 4-5 children at a time.

Is there compensation?

This role includes \$1,000 monthly stipend plus benefits, and housing in a fully furnished home in a private neighborhood near the Texas Medical Center in Houston, TX.

Tell me about the kids.

Almost all children in our care arrive having experienced trauma, neglect or chaos in their lives. Their need for safety, stability, and reassurance is immediate and often intense. The children require a great deal of time, energy and emotional resources from their caregivers.

Will I be trained?

House Parents participate in an extensive training program to enhance their abilities to meet the needs of the children. We strive to educate all caregivers on the importance of early intervention when working with emotionally and behaviorally challenged, and often medically fragile, children.

How does this experience help me achieve my goals?

House Parents leave our program with knowledge and experience that they can apply to the complex social problems faced by children and families in the child welfare system to achieve innovative solutions. The skills cultivated while participating in the Hands of Hope House Parent program are excellent life and work experiences for individuals pursuing careers in social work, medicine, psychology, education, public health, and non-profit management.
