<u>4. Cubes</u>

- All graduate students are assigned a cube to share with another graduate student in the department (in 253 Burrowes Bldg.).
- Your login for this computer will be different than your normal PSU login information.
- You will have a key to the cubes' door please always close and lock the door if you are the last one to leave
- All items (including food) that sit on the front table are available to use (and eat)
- The cubes are our regular working space. You can offer office hours here but be considerate of other people when offering oral, make-up exams, or other meeting (you can book a room in the library for those: http://psu.libcal.com/spaces?lid=506)
- Printing: this printer can be finicky; this printer can take a LONG time; be respectful of others in the department and don't use this to do lots of print copies (use the copier on the fourth floor in the mailroom)

 - Book: you can request to have it brought to the front desk for pickup. You will receive an email that it has arrived. Bring your PSU ID for pickup.
 - Article: It will appear as "ONLINE" when you search. Then you can download.

7. Department Events:

Official:

- Speaker Series: invited guest speakers to speak about a variety of topics: ranging from history, philosophy, literature, and linguistics. <u>YOU SHOULD GO</u>.
- Job Talks: prospective faculty members to the GSLL department present their research. <u>YOU SHOULD GO</u>.
- Department Wide Dinners: At the beginning of of the year, there will be several dinners
 - (1) welcome dinner with the Comparative Literature department
 - (2) dinner for German graduate students to volunteer for year long departmental "duties". <u>YOU SHOULD GO</u>
- Kaffeestunde: weekly hourly afternoon tea, coffee, and snacks free and open to the public; all are welcome who would like to speak German with others.

Unofficial:

• Bierstunde: faculty members, graduate students, other graduate students who speak German and like beer, and of-age undergraduates go somewhere for a few hours to drink a beer or two and chat.

Beyond the Department Events:

- CLS (Center for Language Science) Speaker Series: language science and (applied) linguistics speaker series hosts invited guests, current faculty, and graduate student speakers to present their past or current research. Fridays at 9:00 in Moore; all are welcome. <u>ADVISED FOR LINGUISTICS</u>
- Poetry without Borders: yearly event free and open to the public, where students and faculty at Penn State are invited to read poetry in a language that they speak.

8. Volunteer Opportunities (Clubs and Organizations):

German Specifically

- Kaffeestunde set/pick up, make coffee, stick around, chat in German, buy snacks...
- Filmabend organize which films and who in the department will be responsible for showing them; send weekly emails alerting entire department and undergraduate students of the weekly film
- Webmasters in charge of keeping social media, website, etc. updated
- Speaker Series/Job Talks in charge of sending out information concerning these talks

- German Graduate Student Organization various elected roles: president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary
- German Day: planning, orchestrating, organizing, and running German Day.
- Poetry without Borders: planning, orchestrating, organizing, and running Poetry without Borders.

Beyond the Department

- YSSS (Young Scholar Speaker Series) a yearly language science/ linguistics/ applied linguistics poster session hosted by Penn State for all stages of language research
- SLA Reading Group a small reading group that reads and discusses SLA articles
- Comparative Literature Speaker Series a weekly talk (same as our department's), but a comparative literature focus.

10. Getting Around: Parking and Buses

- Parking is expensive! Students cannot park in public campus garages until after 4:00pm on weekdays. However on weekends (but not holidays), parking is free in on-campus garages (exceptions for big game weekends). Parking permits for on-campus garages and lots are limited. More information about parking registration can be found here: https://transportation.psu.edu/student-parking-registration
- Off-campus garages nearest campus include the Pugh Street, Fraser Street garages, and Beaver Avenue garages. Parking is \$1.00/hour (Monday-Saturday 6am-6pm) and \$.75 (Monday-Saturday 6pm-6am). You can pay at the Pay Station via card or cash, or on the way out at the garage exit via card only (the signs don't tell you this). On "special event" weekends (including home football games), parking is \$2.25/hour. Monthly & prepaid garage passes are available.
- Street parking is rare during the week near campus. There is also limited lot parking downtown. These parking spaces can be paid for through the Parkmobile app or at meters/kiosks. All downtown parking is free on Sundays from 6am-10pm. More information about downtown parking & garages can be found here: <u>https://www.downtownstatecollege.com/get-around/parking-information/</u>
- CATA Bus: Make sure to fill out application prior to going to the Eisenhower parking deck to pick up pass. They will not help you until you've completed it and

have a confirmation email. The pass costs either \$15/month or around \$180 for the academic year through end of June. Bring your Penn State ID card and a document verifying your address (lease, bill etc.).

To be eligible for the RIDEPass, you need to live at least 0.75 miles away from any CATA campus service Blue Loop or Red Link stop, you can't have a daytime-access Penn State parking permit, and you can't have an additional bus pass issued by your apartment complex.

If you can't or don't want to get a RIDEPass and also don't have a bus pass issued by your apartment complex, you can still take the bus for \$2.00 (you can get a transfer ticket if you need to take more than one bus line to get anywhere). You need to have the exact fare, as you will not receive any change! If you only have a \$5 bill, you bus ride will be \$5 instead of \$2. You can buy tokens at the CATA office which is located next to the Schlow library (intersection of Beaver and Allen).

- Orthodontics are NOT covered by insurance (except in case of an accident), but you can get a free consultation at Dr. Pine's, and they're very accommodating with payment plans for students

Psychiatry & Psychotherapy

PSU Counselling and Physical Services

- CAPS has both short-term and long-term options:
 - Long-term will be referred out to Cedarbrook which is also on campus
 - Short-term (8-10 sessions): more crisis counseling to get you patched up and on your way. Not a long-term option
 - Support groups and group therapy specifically geared towards graduate students (you should not have to worry about coming into contact with your students in this setting!!)
 - CAPS has walk-in counseling if you are in a crisis

Pharmacy

• UHS has a pharmacy next to the check-in for appointments on the second floor

- CVS accepts prescriptions from UHS, but you will have to pay a copay for the prescription (decently minimal with our insurance plan)
- Boalsburg Apothecary takes PSU SHIP.

IF YOU HAVE AN EMERGENCY AND NEED TO GO TO THE EMERGENCY ROOM FOR SOMETHING SUCH AS RABIES OR STAPH INFECTIONS OUTSIDE OF NORMAL WORKING HOURS: <u>CALL PSU REGISTERED NURSE HOTLINE TO</u> ENSURE THAT YOU ARE NOT DENIED COVERAGE (814-863-4463)

RECOMMENDED PROVIDERS BEYOND PSU: IF ON SEPARATE PLAN (SUCH AS FAMILY'S)

Geisinger: a <u>GIANT</u> medical group that includes services: Walk-In, Inpatient/Outpatient, General and Family Medicine, Pediatrics, Orthopedics, Physical Therapy, Eye-Care

- Takes most insurances
- Has a large variety of providers, will try to find a provider that matches you
- Once in their system, visiting other branches for other services is very easy.

- If you travel abroad for conferences or research purposes using PSU funding, make sure to register your travel with the Travel Safety Network (<u>https://tsn.psu.edu/</u>) at least 30 days prior to departure. If you fail to do so, this may have serious consequences, such as a personal audience with the Director of Graduate Studies (ask Katherine for more details).
