


An Education in Malice by S.T. Gibson


Method: I listened to this one. Audiobook available via Libby

A sapphic, academic-rivals-to-lovers vampiric retelling of Carmilla, An Education in Malice feels like a cold, foggy day on a gothic campus, coffee in hand. Follow Laura as she confronts her reality, sanity, and self. Best enjoyed with a cozy blanket on a dreary day!





This is How You Lose the Time War by Amal El-Mohtar and Max Gladstone

Method: I listened to this one! Audiobook available through libby **Content warnings**: war and violence, depression/suicidality, animal killing, gore

I've read This is How You Lose the Time War three times, and it never gets old. This sapphic enemies-to-lovers, interstellar tale explores how being truly seen is key to being loved. With beautifully perplexing prose, it's perfect for lovers, haters, and everyone in between. Pair with caffeine—you'll need it to untangle the plot while your heart melts.

Minor Detail by Adania Shibli, translated by Elisabeth Joquette

Method: I listened to this! Audiobook available on Libby

Content warnings: sexual assault, imperialism, colonialism, violence

This powerful, short read left me *speechless*. Shibli matter-of-factly examines the gendered realities of living under occupation through the story of a Palestinian woman investigating the assault and murder of another woman on her birthday years prior. I recommend the audiobook for its precise, gripping writing, immersing you in the tension, grief, and daily struggles of Palestinian women. Best paired with empathy and an open mind.
