### Course description

Focuses on the compositional semantics of sentences. Introduces basic set theory and logic. Investigates the empirical linguistic issues of presuppositions, implicatures, predicates, modifiers, tense, aspect, reference, quantifiers, intensionality, and modality.

### **Prerequisites**

The Science of Linguistics (LING 2010Q), or permission of the instructor.

### Workload and grade calculation

50% Homework. There will be a small homework assignment due almost every week. The homeworks will be posted and returned electronically via Google Classroom. Homework assignments will be posted at least 7 days before they are due. How the homework gets graded: with each homework, you'll earn 50 percentage points just by completing the homework. The remaining 50 percentage points depend on how many answers you get correct. The lowest homework grade will be dropped.

20% Midterm. In-class and closed-book. The dates for both the midterm and the final are fixed (see below). Please schedule your other obligations around these dates, because there will be no make-up tests except if necessitated by religious holidays (see below) or medical reasons.

20% Final. See "Midterm" above. Tests the material covered after the midterm.

10% Participation. (i) Asking questions is always welcome! (ii) There will be in-class exercises and discussions at every meeting, providing ample opportunity for you to contribute to the lecture.

Your letter grade for the class will be assigned on the following scale.

Fractional grades will be truncated down to the nearest integer (e.g. 94.7 is truncated to 94). Percentage points will be converted to letter grades only for the purpose of giving midterm and final grades.

#### Policies and other remarks

Policies. Attending class is expected of everyone. I will distribute printed handouts at every lecture, and it is a very good idea to take notes on these handouts and/or on other paper. Any use of cellphones, laptops, or other electronic devices during the lecture is not acceptable, also not for purposes related to the class.

**Extra credit.** Midterm and final may or may not include some extra credit questions, worth up to an additional 5% of each test grade. Homework assignments may or may not occasionally have extra credit questions. There may or may not be an entire homework towards the end of the course that is more challenging than the others and that counts as extra credit in its entirety. Extra credit is an equal opportunity for everyone in the class to improve their grades, so it will

not be issued to individual students upon request. If you want some grade security, I suggest doing all the homework assignments and not missing class.

**How to contact me.** The best way is by e-mail (see above for my e-mail address), or talk to me right before or right after class. Take advantage of my office hours if you can.

**Personal situations.** If anything arises during the semester that may affect your classroom performance, please come talk to me.
