## **Global Trend: Mounting Refugee and Displacement Crises**

As of October 2022, 103 million people have been forcibly displaced from their homes, 36.5 million of which are children under the age of 18.1 The United Nations first defined the term "refugee" in 1951 as a person feeling their country in fear of persecution.2 There has been a longstanding push to expand the definition to include anyone forced to migrate, such as internally displaced persons (IDPs), but to no avail.2 With extreme weather events becoming more frequent, the World Bank estimates 216 million people will be internally displaced by 2050 due to climate change.3

Regardless of whether a person is displaced by conflict, violence, or natural disaster, their forced migration is an extreme circumstance. These populations have specialized needs, such as trauma-informed medical and mental health care. The primary action step long overdue is amending the legal definition of "refugee" so all forced migrants are granted the same rights and protections.<sup>2</sup> This consensus is hopefully the first step in international cooperation on how to address the multiple ongoing crises.
